

BADMINTON ENGLAND HISTORY FACTS and RECORDS

This document highlights the achievements of Badminton Players who have been proud to represent Lancashire County Badminton Association both on National and International Badminton Courts within all Adult age group categories

The History of Badminton:

Badminton House and Estate lies in the heart of the Gloucestershire countryside and is the private home of the 12th Duke and Duchess of Beaufort and the Somerset family.

The Great Hall at Badminton House is famous for an incident on a rainy day in 1863 when the game of badminton was said to have been invented by friends of the 8th Duke of Beaufort.

We know the game of Battledore and Shuttlecock was being played at Badminton House as well as other country houses as far back as the early 1800's.

Battledore or Shuttlecock as it was sometimes called was a game where two players would hit the shuttlecock backwards and forwards to each other, counting how many times they could do this without it falling on the floor. On that rainy day in 1863 one of the guests had the idea of putting some string across from the door to the fireplace in the Great Hall and hitting the shuttle over the string to each other.

The Badminton Association was formed in 1893.

At the meeting there were nine clubs represented, they decided on the rules of the Association and framed the rules for the game of Badminton.

The popularity of the sport increased rapidly with 300 clubs being introduced by the 1920's after World War I, rising to 9,000 shortly after World War II.

The Badminton Association would govern World badminton until 1934.

- In 1934 the Badminton Association changed its name to the Badminton Association of England.
- In 2005 it changed its name again to Badminton England (BE).

The first recorded Open tournament (open to anyone) was staged by Guilford Badminton Club in 1898. This was the birth of the World's oldest and most prestigious Badminton tournament which would eventually become known at the All-England Badminton Championships.

In 1903 the first International Badminton match was played in Dublin between Ireland and England.

The International Badminton Federation (IBF) was formed in 1934 with nine founding members: England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Denmark, Holland, Canada, New Zealand and France. As a consequence the Badminton Association became the Badminton Association of England.

The IBF eventually changed its name and is now known as the Badminton World Federation (BWF) and has over 176 member nations.

The Thomas Cup is a World Badminton Men's **Team** Championship played since 1949. The Thomas Cup was donated by Sir George Thomas, an Englishman who was the first President of the International Badminton Federation.

The Uber Cup is a World Badminton Women's **Team** Championship played since 1957. The Uber Cup was presented by the former English international and All England Champion, Betty Uber, who had the idea of creating a women's event similar to the Thomas Cup. She made the draw for the inaugural 1956-1957 tournament, at Lytham St. Annes in Lancashire.

In 1966 - Badminton was included in the Commonwealth Games held in Kingston, Jamaica. Players competed and represented either England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The European Badminton Union was founded in 1967 during a meeting of eleven national organisations. In 1968 - Badminton players competed in the inaugural European Championships. In 2006 it changed its name to Badminton Europe (BEC).

In 1977 - Badminton players completed in the inaugural World Championships, held in Malmo Sweden.

A tournament organised in September 1979, marked the arrival of 'Open' Badminton and gave players an opportunity to receive money for winning whilst playing Badminton.

There had been much debate and heated argument for many years questioning if Badminton was now amateurism, professionalism or sham amateurism.

The International Badminton Federation intervened and adopted revised rules, which would not harm aspirations for Badminton to become an Olympic sport.

Badminton was officially granted Olympic medal status in the 1992 Barcelona Games.

The Sudirman Cup is a World Badminton Mixed **Team** Championship played since 1989.

There are five matches Men's and Women's Singles, Men's and Women's Doubles and Mixed Doubles.

The Sudirman Cup was given by the Badminton Association of Indonesia as a memorial to the late Dick Sudirman, a long-serving member of the BWF council.

The All-England Seniors (Veterans) Badminton Championships

have been taking place on an annual basis - they are open for International entries and now competition takes place in the following age categories

Over 35's, 40's, 45's, 50's, 55's, 60's, 65's, 70's

Only doubles matches for older categories were played initially but Singles matches and younger age categories have gradually been added

There have been many Lancashire County Players who have been successful in one or more age categories since its inception over 100 years ago until Covid 2021 - although because this is an International event, they are shown as representing England
